


It has been a busy summer with all sorts of Catholic Life events taking place. from pilgrimages far and near to sunflower planting!

CAREERS UPDATE

Year 10s took part in work experience week in May with 83% of students going on an external work placement. They thoroughly enjoyed it and as usual the feedback from employers was excellent!

Year 10s had a visit to York St John University where they had a campus tour, a talk on student finance and societies and also took part in some design competitions

They also went to S6F to do some taster sessions on their chosen subjects, experiencing life of a sixth form student.







Over the course of the academic year, we have been delighted to be able to offer a range of rewards to our students. In 2024-2025, we have awarded:

130,898 House Points Awarded (Over 62,000 more than 2023-2024)

In addition, we have:

- Presented 445 students with at least 1 Club 100 certificate this academic year!
- Awarded 5 form groups a team prize (sweet treat) for being the highest attending form each half-term so far this year
- Posted over 1000 individual student 'shoutouts' on Social Media
- Posted 35 weekly House Group 'shout-outs' on Social Media
- Served over 200 Hot Chocolates to those with the highest House Points in half-term 1.
- Presented over 100 Selection Boxes to the top individual House Points scorers in
 - half term 2.
- Given all students in Matthew House a chance to enjoy a Halloween and Christmas Movie for being the winning House in half term 1 and 2.
- Given all students in John House a chance to enjoy a Movie at February and Easter for being the winning House in half term 3 and 4.
- 100 students attended a Pizza Party for having the highest House Points scores in half term 3.
- Awarded 25 luxury Easter Eggs to the highest House Points scorers in half term 4.
- Given all students in Luke House a Movie in June for being the winning House in HT5.
- Served almost 200 ice cream sundaes to the top House Points scorers in half term 5.
 Issued over 3,500 Mission Points.

A farewell message for Miss. Robinson from Mr. Podlewski on behalf of the school community.

The end of the school year sees a moment that has been long anticipated but never fully prepared for, Aishling Robinson, our headteacher will depart St. Augustine's after spending her entire teaching career at our school. Her decision to step down from her post will both leave a hole in the organisation of the school but also in the hearts of the many students and families who have supported her journey with unwavering dedication.

On a personal note, I feel blessed to have worked with Aishling for the past 18 months. She embodies the spirit of St. Augustine's with a relentless work ethic, exceptional leadership, and an indomitable will. For our school, this will not just be the departure of a member of staff —it will be the end of an era.

Aishling's story at St. Augustine's is one of devotion and perseverance, ever since joining the school as an NQT in September 2013. From that moment, Aishling quickly became one of the cornerstones of the school. From my time working with Aishling, her focus has always been an ensuring our students have the best possible opportunities. Her leadership, and her integrity set her apart. She has an un-paralleled ability to rally both staff and students alike, her never-give-up attitude, and her commitment to leading our school the right way earned has earned her the respect of staff, students and our families.
